

## **GCT Vanterm 50th Anniversary Commemorative Logo Reflections**

To commemorate five decades of operations within these territories, GCT commissioned a special logo that reflects the rich maritime trading heritage of our host Nations and celebrates our shared values: stewardship and safety in the Burrard Inlet.

## **About the Logo - Artist Reflection**

The paddle honors our shared maritime traditions following the ancient paths of the Coast Salish People throughout the Salish Sea. Celebrating 50 years of GCT Vanterm operations builds on generations of stewardship and innovation. The Orca dorsal fin symbolizes our connection to the natural world, as Orcas have inhabited these waters for countless generations. The Orca represents family, unity, and cooperation, reflecting the relationships formed through a shared journey between our communities.



GCT respectfully acknowledges that we operate our terminals on the traditional and treaty territories of the x<sup>w</sup>məθ k<sup>w</sup>əyəm (Musqueam Indian Band), scəẁaθən məsteyəx<sup>w</sup> (Tsawwassen First Nations), səlilwəta<del>l</del> (Tsleil-Waututh Nation), and Skwxwú7mesh Úxwumixw (Squamish Nation). We recognize and honour the deep history, culture, and stewardship of these Indigenous communities.



## **About the Artist**

The selected design was created by Chief Ian Campbell, whose Squamish ancestral names are Xalek and Sekyu Siyam. A hereditary Chief of the Squamish Nation with lineage from both the Squamish and Musqueam Nations, Chief Campbell was raised on the Eslha7an reserve in North Vancouver, on the shores of the Burrard Inlet. Immersed in the traditions, language, and teachings of his people, he has long been a passionate advocate for revitalizing Coast Salish art and design. His artistic practice spans painting, carving, weaving, regalia-making, and digital design.
